Senior High School (SHS) Science Department, along with STEM Club officers, led the celebration of this year’s Science month at Plaridel Hall lobby that started on October 7 and lasted for 11 days. With the theme “Science for the People: Enabling Technologies for Sustainable Development”, students showcased their excellence through participating activity which aims to highlight creativeness and their intellectual capacity.

STEM Club officers assisted the participants who joined the Science quiz bee held at the roof deck of the Rizal Hall building. Grade 11 winners of morning-shift were from STEM 1, STEM 2, and HUMSS 1. While students of afternoon-shift which obtained the highest scores during the quiz bee competition were from STEM 7, ICT 7, and HUMSS 13. In line with this, coaches from Champion Youth Philippines (CYP), in participation of Science Department and STEM Club officers, handled a seminar about mental health awareness among selected sections from different strands. Mr. Ryan Quirante - CYP President - discussed the importance of keeping one’s mind positive and gave his motivating remarks toward pupils.

Social media news is the raw and unedited version of mainstream news. There are no news anchors to tell you what the crime was instead you do it for yourself. There are no editing team that blur the unrecognizable faces or bloodied bodies. It is all there for you to see.

Media censorship is crucial to responsible journalism because it protects the viewers from the violence and gore of the even and also protects the dignity of the people involved. In journalism, one must think about the ethical implications not only the technical aspect of the news. One must remember that behind every disturbing crime or event is another human being that has rights and that should be respected by the journalist and the media.

FAKE NEWS: SOGIE BILL WILL
UNDERCUT ACADEMIC FREEDOMS

The Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity and Expression (SOGIE) Equality bill is being slurred by people who have not interpret and fully understood it. So much more when people whose job is to implement laws are the one in peddling inane lies to deceive the public.

The initial version of the bill filed in the 12th Congress by the Akbayan party list Rep. Etta Rosales, the ADB (House Bill 2784) only wanted to address discrimination based on sexual orientation of a person. However, few advocates capitalized the need to include “gender identity” in the backbone of the bill. The bill was modified by then by the Lesbian and Gay Legislative Advocacy Network-Philippines (Lagablab) to include gender identity in 2003. It was subsequently renamed as “The Act prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity and providing penalties hereof.” This was then provided as the basic descriptions of the bill.

The SOGIE equality bill also known as “Anti-discrimination bill” (ADB) has been emphasized by Sen. Tito Sotto to undercut academic freedoms penalizing the catholic institutions to disentangle their discriminatory measures for the LGBTQ+ students.

This statement of Sen. Sotto was maligned by Dr. Tesa Casal De Vela, executive director of Women and Gender Institute in Miriam College during the second SOGIE equality bill hearing last September 4, 2019. According to De Vela “Academic freedom does not include freedom to discriminate. Religious freedom does not include freedom to hate speech”.

The practice of one’s religion is constitutionally certain, but it is never absolute for it shows limitation when rights of others were being denied access. More than preparing students to become religious, sectarian and religious schools must always be weighed of basic humanistic freedom. Most cases, if the role of the school is to establish wholesome religious education, it is the dependability of its students to follow and exercise such measures.

The sources of suffering are based on unrecognized fear without full awareness and understanding. The furtherance of the SOGIE bill only accounts the measure of substantive democracy in our country that when others were marginalized, the government shall uplift the sector to balance the inequality to the social strokes.

Senate President Vicente “Tito” Sotto 3rd is one of these people. As the leader of the Senate, Sotto should exercise prudence in criticizing proposed laws. He must demonstrate to the public the proper way, one that requires careful analysis of what is being proposed.

And here, Sotto fails miserably. He accuses the Sogie bill of providing a backdoor route to legalize same-sex marriages in the country. He anchors this mistaken notion on his wrong interpretation of the proposed provision that prohibits anyone from denying a person any license on the basis of the latter’s sexual orientation, gender identity and expression. He argues that this would include the issuance of a marriage license. He even cultivates an unfounded fear when he stressed that a public official can go to jail if he or she denies issuing a marriage license to a same-sex couple.

After the awarding of ceremony and token to the last speaker, the program was ended by the adviser of The Arellano Standard Manila, Ms. Abigail H. Cayco - as she expressed her gratitude towards the participants, speakers, and officers during the closing remark.

HINUGTAN BEACH: A PARADISE AWAY FROM THE LIMELIGHT

Are you thinking of going to a fine vacation into a captivating beach after a stressful school engagement? Are you thinking of enjoying that vacation as if you're scrolling along a sundry of seascides without a bunch of tourist crowds along your way? Or are you thinking of an aesthetic destination with exciting spectacles and can offer you waves of gateway adventures? Well, if you are, I suggest you a great and vibrant place to add on your bucket list. Ready yourself to embrace the open air and soothing waves of Hinugtan Beach in Buruanga, (pronounced as bur-wang-ga) Aklan.

A general direction of sunset rise against Buruanga, a district in Aklan, the westernmost part and a boundary of Aklan across its neighbouring province along the Panay Island. Here, you can find the so-called Hinugtan Beach, a spitting image of Boracay Island for they both possess white sand. But it is not just about the white sand, this intriguing Hinugtan Beach can offer us more. It is a perfect place for adventurous visitors for it offers a great number of pleasurable experiences such as snorkelling and diving so as a perfect place of underwater exploration. This place poses a great and relaxing ambience because it's not crowded and no loud noises which will enable you to enjoy your privacy. It is a good place to clear one's mind and get away from the busy city for the mean time. This beach also features Godly sceneries, from its surrounding cliffs, corals, to its playful waves and its aqua blue clear water that is very inviting. PREPARE YOUR CAMERA, a very essential reminder, for it is indeed a world-class paradise and an instagrammable beach.

However, going there is a kind of hassle and tiring for some roads were not that well-constructed, and it takes you 2-3 hours of trip coming from Kalibo (capital of Aklan) to Buruanga town-proper. You can rent or ride a van (it usually costs 200-300 pesos) if you wish to use land transportation. As you arrive to the town, you can hire a tricycle or motorcycle to send you off to the beach. Meanwhile, if you are off on sea transportation, from Caticlan, you can hire a boat though the price varies per driver or operator, but it usually depends on the number of passengers (it usually costs 50 pesos or so). But I highly recommend you to take land transportation for it is much safer than the sea, because some boat farers don't provide life vests. You won't have a problem while you are in this adventure for people there are hospitable and generally accommodating.

District of Buruanga, so as Hinugtan Beach advocates conservation of marine resources and environment friendly grounds. For this reason, the beach was remained untouched (virgin island as what they used to call it). It has cottage, resorts and small villas which accommodate visitors so they can rest for a day or even overnights for a cheap price. Instead of an entrance fee, Hinugtan Beach charges 40 pesos per head (excluding the driver if you rent a vehicle) for an environmental fee. Buruanga residences are free from it. They also have first aid personnels in case of some incidents such as sea urchin poisoning. However, night life and extreme beach activities have no place on this beach. Compared to Boracay, Hinugtan Beach is undeniably much better in terms of cleanliness and ambience.

Indeed, Hinugtan Beach embodies a romantic seascape, and it sways to the world of splendid escapade with various context. The sun is rising to strike rays to its playful water. Each bud comes together to form a beautiful coral. Treasure this limelight and appreciate its horizon. Prepare yourselves for another adventure. Anchors away!

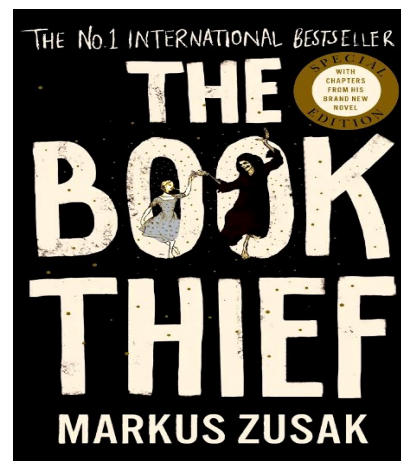


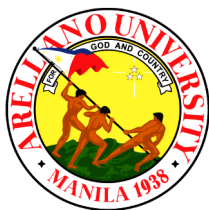

EPIC BIOPICS

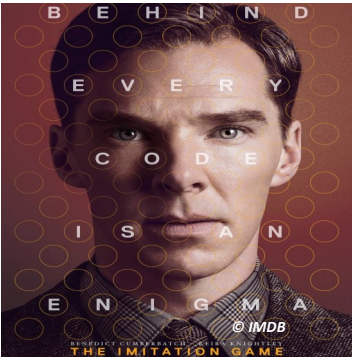

One hundred ninety-one (191) respondents from the total population of the junior high school students and teachers of Arellano University – Jose Rizal High School participated in the conducted survey and were divided into four batches. The first batch was the grade seven (7) followed by grade eight (8), grade nine (9) and grade ten (10) and was done simultaneously.

Plastic Hollow Blocks an Experimental

Abstract

The aim of the study is to reduce the plastic pollution caused by the accumulation of plastic waste in the environment and to increase peoples control of their resources while reducing Non-Biodegradable wastes. Plastic has been a real success during 1960’s since its commercially developed. Many ways have been to reduce the plastic waste but some of them requires machine/equipment to catalyze the nitrogen oxide and other pollutants in air into non-hazardous substances which require higher cost. An experimental research was proposed by the researchers to produced a plastic hollow blocks that will reduce plastic waste in the environment and made the hollow blocks more durable, eco-friendly, low cost and can be shared to educate fellow student and the community on how to integrate plastic hollow blocks as a livelihood program.

Data Gathering Product

Plastic hollow blocks and the procedures as follows:
Sand, Cement, Plastic chip bags, Water, Molde
Step 1: Prepare all materials needed in making plastic hollow blocks
Step 2: Cut the plastic chip scraps into small piece.
Step 3: Prepare the hollow block molder
Step 4: Mix the sand, cement, water and the shreaded plastic scrap.
Step 5: Put the mixture of the cement and plastic scraps in the molder and let it dry for at least 24hours.

Treatment of Data

The researchers used 1Kg of sand, 1Kg of cement, 6L of water and 30 pieces shredded plastic scrap is the portion to 1 Plastic hollow blocks.

This study utilized the descriptive method as an investigation aim to present fact concerning the nature and relates observation to the presence of the certain of other condition in order to develop a frame of relationship. This study focuses on the satisfaction of the facilities of the students in junior high school in relation to their academic standing, S.Y 2019-2020. This study is definitely status-oriented. Therefore, the best method to be used so as to tackle the task of presentation is the descriptive approach.

A ready-made tool (survey questionnaire) from the Facilities and Maintenance Department is given to the respondents.

The researcher modified it by identifying which of the sub-questions belong to Cleanliness and Comfort Factors Construction Instrument

The instrument used was based on the cleanliness and comfort variable. Two of the main factors that is important to promote learning environment conducive for everyone.

The researchers utilized a Point Scale. The four (4) – point Scale with the following descriptions and interpretation was used for the first two parts of the questionnaire.

CORN HUSK AS EFFICIENT ALTERNATIVE PLASTIC BAG IN



Final product of corn husk as efficient alternative plastic bag experiment

Abstract

Plastic is material consisting of any of a wide range of synthetic or semi-synthetic organic compounds that are malleable and so can be moulded into solid objects. Plasticity is the general property of all materials which can deform irreversibly without breaking but, in the class of mouldable polymers, this occurs to such a degree that their actual name derives from this specific ability. Plastics are typically organic polymers of high molecular mass and often contain other substances.

Due to their low cost, ease of manufacture, versatility, and imperviousness to water, plastics are used in a multitude of products of different scale, including paper clips and spacecraft. In developed economies, about a third of plastic is used in

buildings in applications such as piping, or vinyl siding. Other uses include automobiles, furniture, and toys.

Plastics have many uses in the medical field as well, with the introduction of polymer implants and other medical devices derived at least partially from plastic. Plastic is frequent to use in packaging distinct in plastic bags and plastic wrapper that is having a huge contribute in fabricating a baleful environment

that causing a pollution, climate change, in addition to use of natural resources and waste from plastic bag production, plastic bags can increase the risk of flooding, plastic pollution in oceans has been shown to have a negative impact on hundreds of different species of marine life.

Precisely of this problem that all of us facing, The Researchers revamp the use of corn husk as alternative plastic bag that proselyte in the field of wrapping and packaging as paper bag but in the use of the raw material; not only in food production but also in craft industry.

Corn husk is one of the agricultural residues which are abundant, inexpensive, and readily available source of renewable lignocellulosic biomass. Cellulose nanocrystals (CNCs) were extracted from corn husk by alkali and bleaching treatments followed by sulfuric acid hydrolysis treatment. (www.researchgate.chemical-composition-of-corn-husk.com).

The pulping of corn husk and was achieved through Chemical Pulping —

process (Soda ash pulping) and the pulps obtained by boiling it in at least 2 hours with containing sufficient amount of water (2 gallons) and 8 table spoon of sodium carbonate (Na2CO3). Grind the boiled material until in looks soggy fibres and replaced it through the application of mould and deckle Emplace the product in a massive pressure compressed; parch it and leave it for at least 2 nights and 3 days.

This research focused on how to reduce the use of plastic bags and also to minimize the application of wood as paper.

Methodology

Materials:

- 1 dozen corn
- 2 Gallons of water
- 8 Tablespoons of Soda Ash
- Container or strainer
- Large Stainless Steel Pan
- Stainless steel or plastic utensils
- Paper making tools such as Moulde and Deckle
- Felt paper, paper towels, dish towels or couching paper

"Last 5 minutes." The proctor exclaimed. Her heart clenched as she looked at the crumpled papers surrounding her.

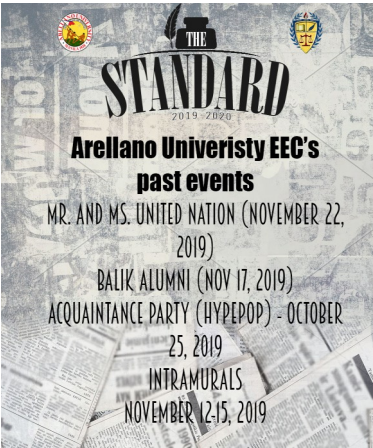
"Oh no." She shouted internally.

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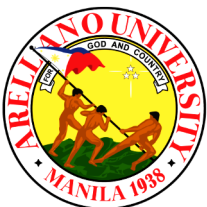
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PURGE NIGHT

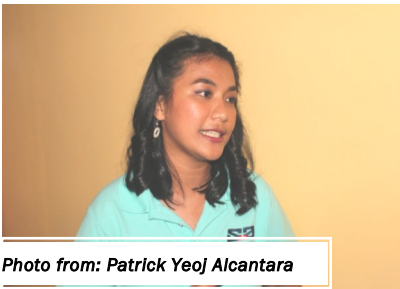

When it rains it pours... in sports.

Ernest John Obiena, a 6-foot-1 Asian Athletics Championships reigning champion, defeated five other rivals for the Chiari gold medal. Ernest John Obiena is a Filipino pole vaulter. Before breaking the Asian Athletics Championships record, he held the Philippine national record in pole vaulting with a record of 5.76 meters achieved early this year. EJ Obiena secured a berth in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics by surpassing the qualifying standard by making a 5.81 meters finish in the Men's Pole Vault competition of the Salto Con L'asta In Piazza Chiari 2019 in Italy on September 3, 2019.

Weeks later, another Filipino secured a slot in Tokyo as gymnast Carlos Edriel "Caloy" Yulo reached the Olympic qualifying mark at the World Championships in Stuttgart, Germany. Caloy made a historic mark of winning the Philippines' first ever world championship gold in gymnastics. He won the gold medal in the Men's floor exercise of the 49th FIG Artistic Gymnastic World Championship last October in Stuttgart, Germany. The 19-year-old gymnast topped the competition with a final score of 15.300, besting top qualifier Artem Dolgopyat of Israel (15.200) who placed 2nd and Multiple World Champion Ruoteng Xiao of China (14.933) who settled for the bronze.

In less than 24 hours, Nesthy Petecio became the second Filipino to win the gold medal in a world championship. Nesthy Petecio emerged as the second Filipina world boxing champion as she ruled the featherweight division of the 2019 AIBA Women's World Boxing Championships on Sunday, October 13 at FSK Sports complex in Ulan Ude, Russia. Petecio pulled off a split decision, 3-2 over the host country's bet, Liudmila Vorontsova, with 3 judges from Australia (30-27), Korea (30-27) and Ireland (29-28), saw the fight in favor of Petecio while Japan (30-27) and Argentina (29-28) had it for the Russian fighter.

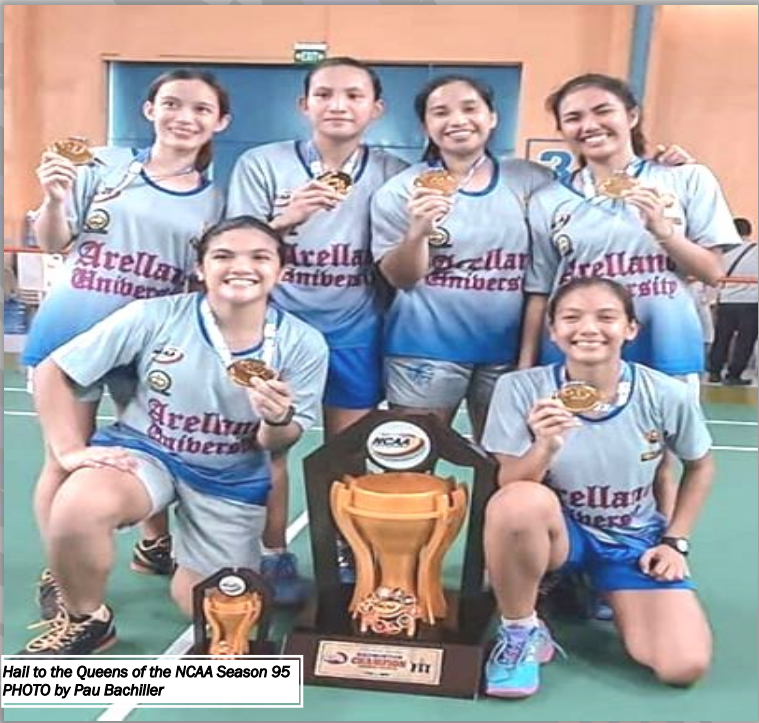

55 Lumad schools called 'NPA factory'

JOSE R. The Department of Education (DepEd) Region 11 instructed the suspension of the "permit to operate" of 55 lumad schools around the Davao region. The decision to suspend the schools was based on an order from Leonor Briones, Secretary, to suspend the schools which had only been approved for approval of their status. Report claimed that the schools was promoting "left-leaning philosophies," encouraging students to protest against the government, and using children to rally. School programs were also allegedly not in line with DepEd's curriculum. According to the DepEd representative, Maria Eugenia Nolasco, Executive Director of Salugpungan Ta ' TanuIgkanogon Community Learning Centers, has already received the suspension order, School officials and employees will be given five days to respond as to why their permit to operate should not be revoked.

They said that the students here are forcing to learn about activism, hate the government and a factory of NPAs. There are no concrete evidences about it, but the DepEd continues to suspend the permit of the 55 schools.

One of the 55 schools of Lumad is still ongoing because of the willingness of other students and teachers, however; DepEd also suspended their permit to operate. It's illegal and inappropriate because there are no formal and legal basis and it did not go through due process. Many of the Lumad children's education, as well as teachers, will be severely affected to this situation. Moreover, there are no concrete information about it because there is no proof for this issue.

Some of us don't realize the importance of education of the student in Lumad schools, the poverty there is high and the only way to have a better life is through education. However, the Department of Education itself keep pushing the act of shutting down the Lumad schools, there is now formal investigation about it. This issue needs to be acknowledged and gain more exposure so that the government may take justified action.

It is hard to see many of the students to be forced to stop because of false allegation in their schools, education is more important than everything else. •

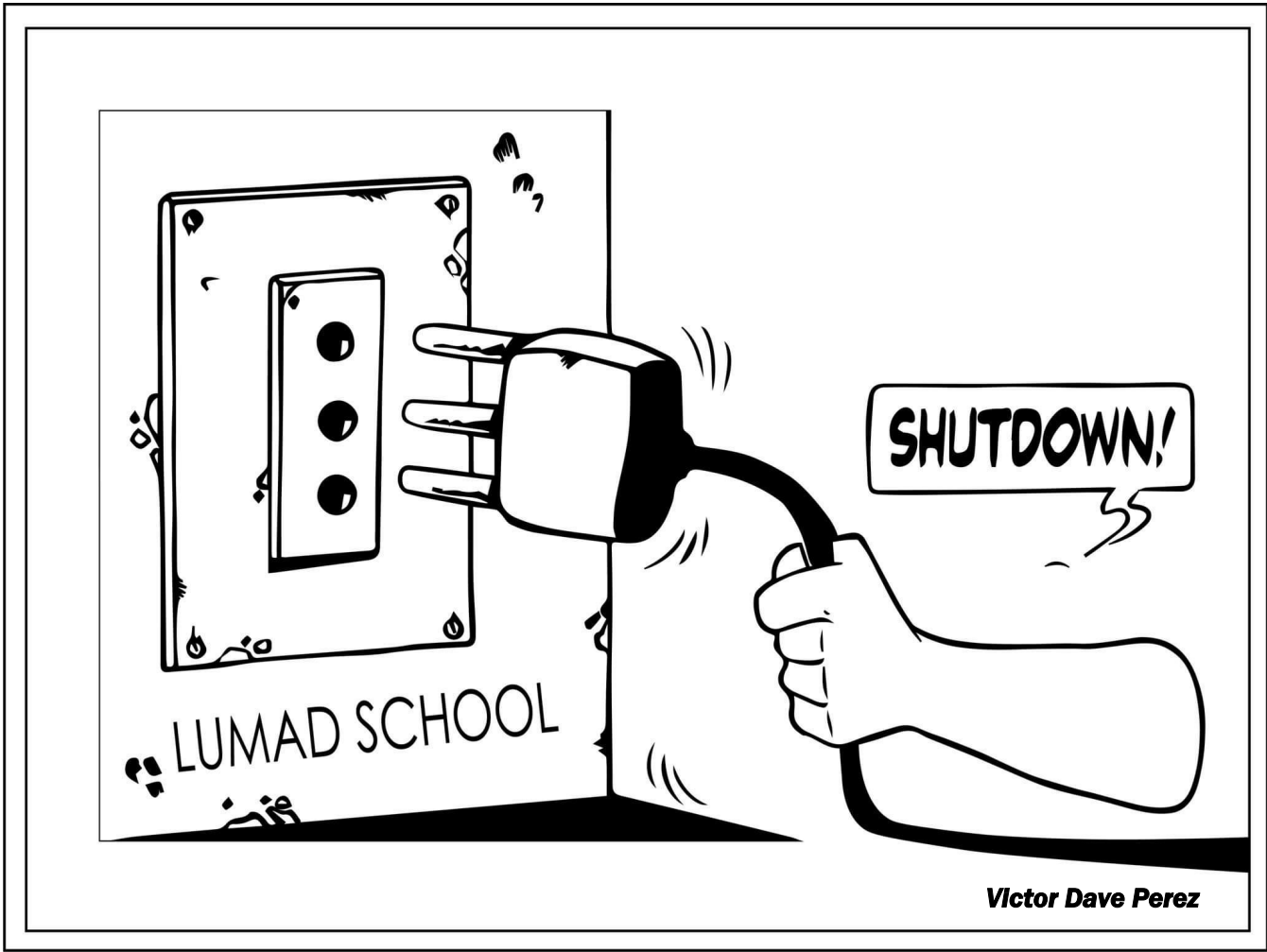

The said institution taught the Lumads through their indigenous learning systems. Recently, it has become a target of the Military Vilification Campaign as the institution has alleged ties to the New People's Army (NPA) and is allegedly used as NPA training centers. According to Deped-11 spokesperson, JanelietoAtillo, the shutting downs were ordered shortly after a DepEd appointed, 5-man fact-finding committee investigated and that it had submitted "substantial evidence" of non-conforming against STTICLC last August 2019.

Prior to the establishment of STTICLC, the Lumad children had a hard time going to school every day due to the great distance of their homes to any other learning institutions. According to the Philippine Constitution 1987 Article 14 Section 2, "The State shall establish maintain, and support a complete adequate, and integrated system of education relevant to the needs of the people and society; encourage non-formal, informal and indigenous learning systems, as well as self-learning, independent, and out-of-school study programs, particularly those that respond to community needs." It is our duty, as Filipinos and as human beings to ensure that this right is given to every Filipino, regardless of ethnicity and political preference. This closing of Lumad schools is unfair to the students who will be greatly affected by this actions. It is also unfair that we keep our silence on this issue. It is imperative that we always had a keen mind and eye for what's happening in our society. More importantly, it is important that we must do the right and humane thing for our Lumad brothers. •

Republic Act No. 8371: The Prohibited Knowledge

MABINI October 8th of 2019, four months after the suspension of their permit to operate for allegedly teaching "left-leaning ideologies", the Department of Education in Davao region has formally ordered the permanent closure of the 55 Lumad Schools that were run and operated by the nonprofit Salugpungan Ta' Tanu Igkanogon Community Learning Center, Incorporated (STTICLCI). According to the article of *MIN-DANEWS*, headed by the national security adviser Hermojenes Esperon Jr., the task force to end local communist armed conflict finds that the "Lumad Schools deviated from the curriculum set by the Department of Education." Moreover, they also reported allegedly that the indigenous students were being used in illegal protests and were taught ideologies that advocate against the government. However, Salugpungan along with the other Lumads deeply doubted the accusations pressed to them. In a statement from an article, Salupongan said that to justify the shutdown of the schools, they would fight the "fabricated accusations and Red-tagging" of the government on them. Advocates in addition, claim that no due process was observed when Lumad schools were ordered for suspension on July 18, 2019.

DepEd wants the Lumad not to wake to realities and to keep them fooled, victimized and deprived of their rights so it will be easier to rob them of their ancestral land, which is their life," said Eufemia Cullamat (Bayan Muna Representative, a Lumad and a leader of the Manobo). She also stated that it is their rights to have their own ways for education as per Republic Act No. 8371 (Indigenous People's Rights Act of 1997) which ordains that the state shall provide a complete, adequate, and integrated system of education, without prejudice to their right to establish and control their educational systems and institutions by providing education in their language, in a manner appropriate to their cultural of methods and teaching —a reason why the government should revoke their decision in response on what Atillo have said as violation in DepEd Curriculum. Not only in this recent permanent closure of 55 schools that the Lumads were clamped down by the national government with red-tagging and malicious accusations. In 2017, during the peace talks between the government and communist rebels, President Duterte himself said, "Get out of there. I'll have those bombed, including your structures. I will use the Armed Forces, the Philippine Air Force. I'll really have those bombed because you are operating illegally, and you are teaching the children to rebel against the government." pertaining to Lumads.

Clearly, the national government failed to comply their responsibility in protecting the rights for education of indigenous people, which are called as "Lumads" because of their questionable arbitrary-approached with the said issue. They need knowledge in order to protect their ancestral domains and culture from capitalists that are taking their advantage to our 'no read, no write' indigenous people. As Filipinos, our stand should no longer be a question here. Human rights don't need to be argued with opinions for they are *just*. Violation of the government on Human rights should never be an exception and needs to stop. Their rights for education weren't the only one that is infringed here but also the government's power to mandate because of the unfair process done on their released order. We must fight for what is "just", not for what the irony our government is ordering and doing in their ped-estaled-seats. •

A Defense Line

JOSE A.S. "Right to due process!" and "Right to education", cried the Lumadsearlier this year after the Department of Education formally shuts down 55 Lumad schools in Davao City, after their permits were suspended for allegedly teaching its students "left-leaning ideologies".

This scenario felt like the Salem witch hunt all over again, as people seated in power blindly pinpoints allegations against said convicts. But JenelietoAtillo, DepEd-11 spokesperson, said that these are hardly suspicions as DepEd ordered an investigation on the schools owned and operated by the Salugpungan Ta' TanuIgkanogon Community Learning Centers or STTICLCI. The investigation was headed by a 5-man fact-finding committee.

Atillo said that the links to NPA aren't the sole reason as to why the STTICLCI needed to stop their operations, but the findings such as violations of regulations and non-compliance with the DepEd requirements. This, and the fact that the teachers are allegedly not licensed.

These, among a hundred more "findings" is what pushed Education Secretary Leonor Briones to order a suspension for all schools under the STTICLCI.

But then again, we find ourselves circling back to the petition for due process; was there ever an investigation? Was it done independently just so the decision to shut these schools be entirely their

own? What seems to be though, is that the department has taken all said investigators and findings wholeheartedly, without a twitch. Are they enough to risk these children's education, and basically their futures by performing such drastic move?

"We have not seen DepEd officials set foot on these schools to see how vulnerable the teachers and students are from the threats, harassments and attacks from the military and paramilitary." said Save Our Schools (SOS), a network of children's rights advocates,

It is no secret that the Lumad schools have been a subject of heated argument from way back, especially when it was spearheaded by the man sitting in the most powerful place in the country. "I'll rally have those bombed," Duterte warned in 2017. "because you are operating illegally and you are teaching the children to rebel against the government."

Now the real question is; is this move really necessary to ensure the Lumad children's safety? Or yet just another tactic to wrap them under the government's fingers? No matter how much those in power want this to seem rightful and justified, in the end, it is the children who suffers most; forced to transfer in places and get education which isn't appropriate to their ways and culture. All because they can't create a defense line to ensure their rights and secure their futures. And why would they? With their chins already raised, eyes straight ahead and can never bother to look down. •

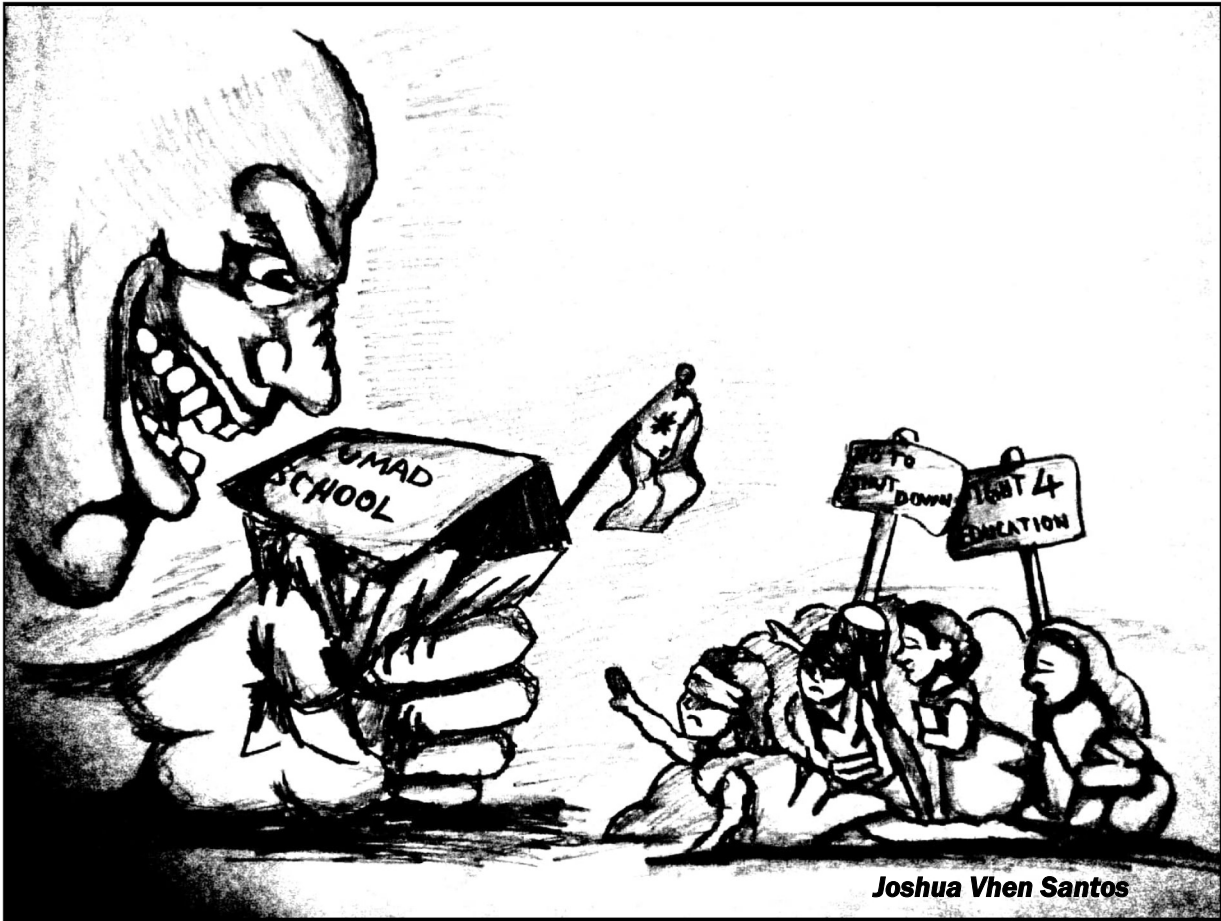

Life in Laurel, Batangas is very simple for the only source of living there is thru agriculture and fisheries yet this mere thing will make one feel unplugged from the very busy vibe of the city.

TRAVEL SPOTS:

Aside from the place noted for its much conserved natural environment, one must also reach and enjoy the following areas within the municipality accessible in just one ride of a tricycle (P60.00).

Taal Lake – With its shorelines located in Bugaan East and Poblacion 3, Taal Lake and Taal Volcano are only meters within our reach. With boats ready to hire, one can enjoy a 15-minute boat ride reaching the Volcano Island where tourists can enjoy hiking, horseback riding, swimming, and even fishing.

Malagaslas Falls/Spring – Located in Brgy. San Gabriel, the falls are located in a forest cover. With the tricycle driver dropping you off Sitio Salipit, head off to Hacienda Cascada before venturing a 10 to 20-minute travel on foot to reach your destination. It is best suggested to contact a guide from the Barangay/Municipal Hall or ask a local to assist you because the trail is quite confusing. Malagaslas Falls/Spring, named after the sound of the water hitting the rock formations below, is a multilayer waterfall with natural sandbagged pools and fresh drinkable water. With only P10 – P20 entrance/environmental fee per person, you can enjoy this freshwater wonder for the whole day. Cottages and Food Stalls are also available within the area but it is best suggested to bring your food to enjoy. Grills are also available to use given that you bring your utensils or cooking ware. The prices for the cottage vary according to the size and style of your choice.

Ambon – Ambon Falls – Another 10 – 20 minutes travel on foot going deeper inside the forest from the Malagaslas Falls, you'll be able to reach the Ambon –Ambon Falls. The trail to falls is composed of crossing streams and going over large boulders, a good place to take some photos and enjoy the virgin scenic view of the natural environment. Ambon – Ambon Falls, named after the drizzles of its water drops, is a two – water jet drop-off falls with a basin-like natural pool at the bottom and is noted as one of the tallest in Batangas Province. The area is enclosed with towering natural rock walls which make it calming and a good place to unwind. Flat surfaces and Picnic Huts are also available however, it is quite limited. The entrance/environmental fee of the Malagaslas Falls includes this area that is why it is like catching two birds with one stone going here.

Antona – From the same barangay, Brgy. San Gabriel, a caved turned mini chapel called Antona has been one of the known travel destinations during the holy week. It has been one of the notable places for holy week devotions.

Laurel Public Market – The Laurel Public Market is just walking distance away from the Municipal Hall. Though it is not the usual “pasalubong” market, you can buy a lot of things there such as freshly picked fruits and vegetables, brewed coffee, fresh from the saltwater fishes, fresh meat and eggs, and different merchandises all for a very low price. You can also eat delicious foods such as Batangas Lomi and freshly baked bread or drink black coffee or milk tea in the Public Market.

The Fantasy World – Though Fantasy World is not located in Laurel, Batangas; it is also a recommended side trip as it is one of the most accessible travel destinations alongside the Sky Ranch and Picnic Grove in Tagaytay. Located in Lemery, Batangas; Fantasy World is an abandoned amusement park that was supposedly made to be the “Disneyland of the Philippines”. The entrance fee though is quite costly with the fixed price of P1, 000.00 (P100.00 for 10 persons/P200.00 for 5 persons/P500.00 for 2 persons), you can enjoy a tour around the whole place and take photos of the whole area.

Summing it all up, having a total of P3, 000.00 (room rent not included) per person is good enough for a 3-day stay in Laurel, Batangas. I suggest that you travel in groups to lessen the expenses. There are also some ways to decrease the said prices such as walking instead of riding tricycles, especially when touring around the area or bringing your school IDs to acquire student discounts. The said prices may change depending on the pricing rates of the drivers. When touring around, always clean as you go and enjoy the whole trip in Laurel, Batangas.

Now tell me when things are really changing.

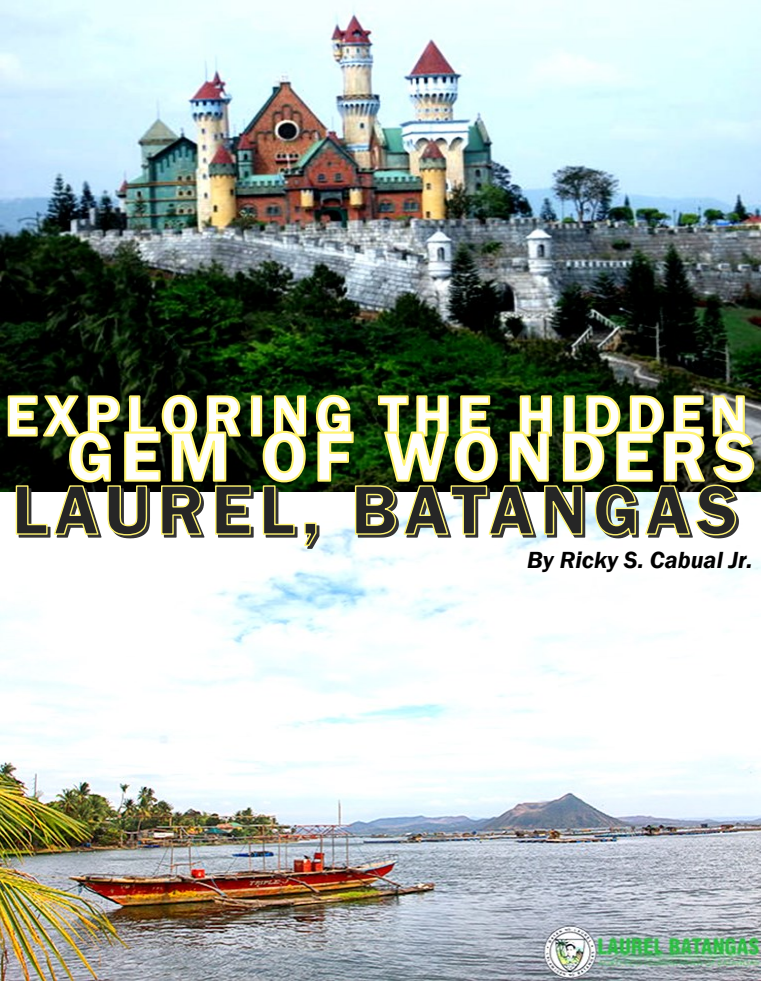
HOW TO GET THERE:

To get there from Manila, ride a bus going to Tanauan City Bus Terminal. There are bus terminals in Pasay (P120.00) or Alabang (P80.00) going to the said destination. For about 1 ½ to 2 hours travel depending on the traffic, you'll be able to reach the Tanauan City Bus Terminal.

Right beside the drop-off area; take a 15 - minute tricycle ride going to the Tanauan Public Market/Tanauan-Laurel Jeep Terminal which costs for about P30.00.

From there, ride a jeepney with the signage “Laurel” costing P50.00. The travel time going to Laurel, Batangas is approximately 1 ½ to 2 hours. It is quite a long travel time but you will not get bored because on your way, the picturesque view of Taal Volcano and Taal Lake can be viewed.

You will be dropped off in front of a 7/11 convenient store meters away from the Municipal Hall of Laurel. There are only a few resorts/inn available nearby where you can stay, just ask for help looking for them or as much as possible have your place to stay booked before traveling.
