AU Guidance Office launches Stress Management Webinar for Teens

The Guidance Office of Arellano University - Juan Sumulong Campus (AUJSC) conducted a webinar entitled, "Stress Management Webinar for Teens" via livestream on their official Facebook page, which was exclusive for the Grade 11 students of AUJSC, last August 8 from 10:00 AM to 12:00 NN.

Ms. Angela M. Macaraeg, RPm, AUJSC College Guidance Counselor, was the mistress of ceremony as Mr. Daniel John Cariazo, AUJSC Senior High School Principal, delivered the opening remarks. Ms. Macaraeg started with an icebreaker game Guess the Zoomed Picture, where the winners won 100 pesos GCash prize. The host then introduced the speaker, Mr. Michael U. Jimenez, RPSY, DIPOD. MA CLINPSY.

Highlighting how emotional intelligence is an important skill, Mr. Jimenez discussed the importance of labeling one's emotions to gain better control over them. He indicated that this would help one to become more logical than emotional when facing stressors.

According to him, healthy emotions can only be achieved by having a healthy state of mind

as the mind is responsible for processing what we experience. He stressed the importance of saying "you are what you think," to remember that a healthy mindset can be attained with healthy thoughts despite the new world we live in today.

The speaker then taught the Butterfly Hug Method, an exercise that could trigger parts of the nervous system to bring anxiety down even if one is alone.

At the latter part of the webinar, Mr. Jimenez then proceeded to address the instances when negative feelings become harmful, indicating the need for therapy. He also shared tips on how to know when an individual needs therapy, namely; (1) Sadness interfering with daily living activities, (2) Self-Harming, and (3) Harming Others. He advised that if friends or family feel like this, one must always listen and not bring toxic positivity.

The webinar formally ended as Ms. Donna Rose E. Matubang, RGC, RPm, AUJSC Senior High School (SHS) Supervising Guidance Counselor, delivered the closing remarks.

The Arellano University - Juan Sumulong Campus (AU-JSC) Senior High School (SHS) celebrated the Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics (STEM) Week with "Expanding the the theme, Horizon: Futures of STEM", attended by STEM Students last October 4 to 7, via Zoom Teleconferencing App.

The Science Festival was organized by the STEM Club with the assistance of the Supreme Student Government (SSG) and AU-JSC SHS STEM teachers.

The four-day event was jump started by a webinar entitled "Breaking Borders: Different Branches of Science Webinar last October 4, 2022 with two sessions, 9:00 AM and 1:00 PM. It was hosted by Ms. Chelsie Alessandra

Concepcion, STEM Club Business Manager, along with Ms. Joelie Claire Gonzales, STEM Club Vice President and was formally started by the opening remarks of Mr. Daniel John C. Cariazo, Senior High School (SHS) Principal.

Ms. Gonzales and Ms. Concepcion introduced the first speaker of AM shift, Ms. Mary Grace Dela Cruz, LPT with a topic entitled "Nuclear Power Awareness: A Scholarly Guide". Ms. Dela Cruz discussed the history of nuclear energy, its role on Earth, its significance to humans, the process of nuclear energy generation, and the advantages and disadvantages of nuclear energy in people's lives.

The second speaker in the AM shift was Ms. Aiza O. Yang, LPT, MSc. Her presentation is entitled "

STEM Students' Crusade: Unravelling the Crux of Plant Biotechnology". Ms. emphasized that biotechnology results in (1) increased crop productivity, (2) enhanced crop protection, (3) improved nutritional value, (4) better flavor, (5) fresher produce, and (6) environmental benefits. Thus, encouraging everyone to support biotech innovations in the Philippines.

The PM portion of the webinar was started with he presentation of Ms. Ma. Andrea Claire the presentation of Ms. Ma. Andrea Claire A. Carvajal, LPT, MSc, entitled "Beyond Eureka Perspective: Α Deeper Understanding of **STEM** Research". The first topic that the speaker discussed was the scientific method: (1) questions, (2) do background research, (3) construct hypotheses, (4) test hypotheses by doing experiments, (5) analyze data, (6) draw conclusions, and (7) report

Ms. Carvajal mentioned that topic selection, Review of Related Literature (RRL), data collection, data analysis, interpretation, conclusion and recommendation are the issues and challenges by the STEM Students according to the study of Ms. Roman (2022). She then proceeded with explaining what are basic parts of STEM research, gave some tips on how to do research, and the language and style.

"In choosing a research topic, narrow your general interest into themes and realities that can be searched, transform them into potential research questions, and be specific, interdisciplinary, evidence-based, and significant," she added.



As full implementation of faceto-face classes is approaching and the threat of diseases such as COVID-19 and Monkeypox remains, Arellano University Supreme Student Council-Main (AUSSC) held its first-ever webinar for the academic year 2022-2023 entitled "COVID-19 Monkeypox: Protecting Ourselves from Getting Infected" last September 19, from 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM via Zoom Teleconferencing App, which was also live streamed on their official Facebook page.

Before the program proper, the event hosts, Ms. Paulyn Castillo Dumpit - AUSSC Head of Project Committee, and Ms. Mica Justine M. Flores -AUSSC Secretary, reminded Zoom participants regarding the webinar guidelines, followed by an opening prayer, singing of the national anthem, and welcoming remarks by the hosts themselves.

Dr. Teodoro "Ted" Javier M.D., Herbosa, former Philippine Health Undersecretary, former Executive Vice President of the University of the Philippines (UP) System, and the current Chairperson of Emergency College Department, UP -Medicine, Manila, congratulated the officers of AUSSC for initiating a "very timely" webinar, as he was called upon as the first speaker of the event.


Dr. Herbosa exhibited Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases' (IATF-EID) National Action Plan (NAP) against COVID-19, wherein he shared the strategic plans of the government that are anchored on the PDITRM Strategy, which stands for Prevent, Detect, Isolate, Treat, Reintegrate, and Mainstream the new normal.

"It's important to understand how the government [was] able to fight COVID-19 to be able to conduct the national elections and then eventually [resuming] classes," face-to-face explained.

He then detailed the key accomplishments of national health facilities wherein 17 out

COVID-19 and Monkeypox Webinar: "The end is almost near"

2022, the country now has a total of 3.93 million COVID-19 cases after recording an additional 2,167 cases; over 60,000 have died of the disease after tallying 35 more; a total of 168 million doses of COVID vaccines have been administered, resulting in 76.2 million or 66.2 percent of the Philippine population being fully vaccinated.

"The pandemic has not ended. We continue to have a pandemic of [COVID-19 but the end] is almost there," he said as he ended his first topic.

Moving forward, Dr. Herbosa attention his Monkeypox, a "public health emergency of international concern" as declared by the World Health Organization (WHO) earlier this year. He underlined that it is not yet a pandemic, and this declaration only signals governments around the globe to implement programs could prevent

"It seems that the smallpox [vaccine]-because it's related to Monkeypox-[kind of] works for those with Monkeypox. [But] this would be a vaccination [only for] those who are exposed and at risk. So [if] you have HIV, Cancer, you'll probably need a smallpox vaccine," he explained.

Dr. Herbosa enumerated the symptoms of Monkeypox, which include: (1) fever for 1 to 3 days before rash, (2) rash appearance, (3) slow rash development, (4) rash distribution where it is denser on the face and present on palms and soles, and (5) presence of Lymphadenopathy. e also disclosed that there is a 10% mortality rate once infected with the disease.

With regards to Monkeypox, the Department of Health (DOH) also reminded the public to practice similar precautionary measures as for COVID-19, such as wearing masks, ensuring good airflow, keeping hands clean, social distancing, as transmissions are also human-tohuman. As of last August 22, there were 4 cases Monkeypox in the Philippines, where the first three had travel histories while the 4th case. despite having no travel history, authorities have yet to confirm local transmissions as of writing.

Dr. Herbosa emphasized the right of every individual to health by saying, "All Filipinos must have fair, just, and equal access to health care." In the addition, government, according to him, should also provide 'good governance' for the health care system to prosper.

At the end of his discussion, he quoted: "See the forest. Most everyone else will be obsessed with the trees." After thanking Dr. Herbosa for his lecture, Ms. Dumpit announced that AUSSC would be holding another booster drive in AU Juan Sumulong Campus (JSC) and encouraged everyone administer booster shots to promote the safety of all AU students.

The hosts then proceeded to the open forum, where Dr. Herbosa answered questions from Zoom participants and Live Facebook viewers. Following this, the Undersecretary of AUSSC, Mr. Jeffry L. Bernades, awarded the Certificate of Appreciation to Dr. Herbosa.

Before heading on to the next **AUSSC** speaker, Undersecretary, Mr. Bernades, facilitated an icebreaker where participants guessed the word/s that corresponded to the emojis flashed on the screen. The event committee gave a prize to Mr. Robie Andrew Manansala after

answering the first item correctly.

Dr. Fredegusto Guido David, Ph.D., an OCTA Research Fellow, a member of the Advisory Council of Experts, a professor of Mathematics at UP - Diliman, and Postdoctoral Fellow Biomedical Engineering at Texas A&M, was introduced as the last speaker of the webinar.

In the first half of his discussion, he presented models showing the trends of COVID-19 cases in the Philippines since 2020. Despite the decrease of cases nationally, Dr. David highlighted the fact that the National Capital Region (NCR), including its neighboring regions, is experiencing an increase in positivity rate.

After this, he showed data from last June to September, stating that the '60 and up' age group tops the percentage of cases moderate, severe, or critical conditions with 17%, followed by ages 0-4 with 10% and ages 50-59 with 9%. In the same period, the '60 and up' bracket also records the highest number in terms of fatality rate with 5.14%, followed by ages 50-59 with 0.69%.

"This is an indication that [vaccines] are working to help prevent moderate, severe, and critical cases. Because this would be much higher back in 2021," he explained.

To cap off his discussion, Dr. David shared that the Monkeypox trend in the United States, where the highest number of cases in the world is recorded, has now decreased. With only recorded cases in the country, he noted that Dengue is "more of a concern" than Monkeypox due to the rainy season.

To formally end the event, Mr. James Andrew L. Monilla, President of AUSSC, expressed his gratitude to all the speakers, officers, and participants for their cooperation in the event as he delivered his closing remarks. "While it is legal not to use facemasks outdoors, we should still be cautious. We should [keep] those masks on in crowded spaces and in places where there is no good ventilation," he reminded everyone in the latter part of his speech.

PelikuLOVE, in partnership with the National Commission for Culture & the Arts (NCCA) and Philippine Studies and School of Orient African Studies (SOAS) Centre for the Southeast Asian Studies University of London, tallied over 15,000 attendees including all Arellano University (AU) campuses, Lucrecia R. Kasilag Senior High School (LRKSHS), Pamantasan Lungsod ng Maynila (PLM), and Polytechnic University of the Philippines (PUP), as they successfully launched their first ever week-long virtual festival, entitled, 'Shout Out Fest' featuring theme "Maghayag Lumikha", last September 19 to 25, via Zoom Teleconferencing app.

The festival kicked off its first day through an opening program with the greetings and remarks of the Festival's Board of Directors, starting with Palanca Hall of Famer and Playwright, Mr. Rodolfo C. Vera, as he expressed his enthusiasm towards the event.





Solutions Journalism: A Rigorous, Evidence-Based Reporting as a Response to Social Issues

As Journalism gets wider and vast, the Union of **Journalists** of the Philippines - University of the Philippines Diliman (UJP-UPD) conducted a webinar entitled "Solutions Journalism 101: Journalism Solutions Workshop," which was virtually led by Ms. Marian Abio last October 30, 2022 via Zoom Teleconferencing App and Facebook Live Stream.

The webinar was made free for everyone, especially for college students in the field journalism and communication. It was attended by hundreds of journalists from campus different schools and universities including the ones from The Arellano Standard Manila.

Webinar reactors were introduced, namely: Ms. Adelle Chua, Ms. Biena Magbintang, .

Mr. Rome Candaza, Ms. Mavic Conde, and Ms. Katherine Sarmiento who are all in the field of journalism, communication, and advocates.

The speaker for the Solutions Journalism 101 webinar was Ms. Portia Ladrido – Solutions Journalism Network-accredited trainer and INKLINE's co-founder.

Ms. Ladrido started with four core elements of Solution Journalism during the discussion in which she first emphasized solution journalism: (1) Covers a response to the problem and how it happened, (2) **Provides** evidence of impact, looking at effectiveness, not just intentions, (3) Produces insights that can help others respond too, and (4) Points out any limitations or caveats of the response. She then proceeded with the steps on how journalists identify issues ask or precisely questions possible, to know what's missing and assess candidates to be part of the solution stories

"Solution journalism is rigorous, evidence-based reporting on responses to social problems," Ms. Ladrido said.

Considerations for . multimedia formats to be used by journalists and publications were also discussed, such as the (1) Ability, wherein in-house skills and achievements are to be used .for it is mentioned, (2) Background, that includes culture, language, diversity, logistics, and ethics that might affect he adaptation of multimedia formats for the audience, and (3) Conversation, format which is best for newsroom to focus on as a priority.

"As a journalism trainee and as a citizen who wanted to use journalism as a form of public service, it just seemed counterproductive for me to know all of these issues and problems but not have a single clue on how to participate in or even solve these problems," Ms. Ladrido's quick story in pursuing solutions journalism stories and in continuously advocating for the practice.

It was followed by the discussion of the impact of solutions journalism and a clip from "A Brief But Spectacular Take on Telling the Whole Story" of Mr. David Bornstein, a cofounder of the Solutions Journalism Network, on PBS NewsHour as an example and brief explanation of solutions journalism.

As the speaker ended the lecture session, roundtable discussion followed along with the reactors, "I think the key term is evidence-based," one of the reactors, Ms. Chua, emphasized.

On the other hand, Ms. Sarmiento first expressed her acknowledgement to the organizers and gratitude to the attendees of the event, "I would like to underscore the following: we need more journalists who aren't afraid of the technicalities of climate topics," she discussed as she said that journalists also need to take time to reach out to science, technical and community experts that can help with the technicalities such as spelling out difference of climate change stories from reports of regular weather disturbances or disaster risks as she also mentioned the i

mportance of providing feedback to communities.

"It is still people on the ground telling their lived experiences who are the best storytellers," she added.

The other reactor, Mr. Cardaza pointed out influencers with bias or the so-called paid influencers to be disciplined and the needs of every youth to tell community stories with evidence and in accordance with science to bring back the trust of others to journalism.

Ms. Conde added how the elements of solutions journalism affects reporting as their most engaged report is the story they presented with the four core elements of solutions journalism.

In response, Ms. Ladrido expressed her gratitude to the reactor's reactions.

"It's definitely not the same as the way I have explained it but *napayaman* at *napalawak* nila 'yon, (enriched and expanded by them)" she affirmed.



Upon learning of his mother's condition a few months before graduation, he still had trouble accepting the news. For him, the difficulty of acknowledging his mother's diagnosis was heavy. Due to his confusion about the reason why it happened, and the complexity of its nature that Perpiñan instead chose to grasp the matter and live with it rather than overcome it.

"To smile despite the hurt and sadness. And to hope. That's the most important thing: "hope". As long as you have it, nothing is impossible. "Perpiñan added. Fully aware of his mother's serious illness, he kept on going, never losing sight of the track, bearing in mind to consistently put an effort to make the best of the circumstances.

The Arellano University (Official) Facebook page announced on their live stream that Jhon Aldrin M. Perpiñan, with his efforts and sacrifices, successfully graduated on October 1, 2022, with flying colours, earning himself a Latin honour of Cum Laude beside his name. He finished his major in Bachelor of Arts in Political Science at Arellano University.

On top of that, his greatest and most recent achievement of Perpiñan is clearing the admission exam for preferred law school. his Unfortunately, he was not qualified to complete the registration process financial problems. due Nevertheless, the seemingly neverending challenges did not limit him from getting his hands on his ideal job. Even so, he still intends to pursue a career as a lawyer when the time is right.

Perpiñan also lives his life with this motto "You are in charge of your joy, of your worth. You are your own validation" He believes that the challenges in being part of society are the social norms; of constantly being compared to and criticized for your actions and that most people rely on their happiness on validations from another. As a result, they lose sight of their value as an individual. For him, it is crucial to be conscious of the boundaries of your dependence on irrelevant individuals and what they might say about you. Perpiñan is confident that the term "irrelevant" is used for a reason. That way, he is sure that you are free to live your life how you want it. Thus, you can pursue your interests according to your terms.

Perpiñan's message to the youth is "Always have the courage to grow. Don't be afraid to take up space. Focus on the things that you really care about. That means owning your passions. Owning your dreams. Your hopes, and aspirations. Stop letting the world decide your value because you are your own validation. Never back down from your own path to success and never be afraid to fail. Failing means you are learning. Learn and get back up because you matter. Never lose sight of that fact."

Not long ago, Perpiñan joined an online organization for cancer awareness, a group that focuses on giving perception about it and encourages people to prioritize their health. A bridge that helps him know how to work around and aid his mother. He wholeheartedly appreciates and loves his mother. "I am ever so grateful for my mother who fostered a love of learning in me and has never stopped believing in my capabilities as an individual," Perpiñan says.

He also intends to find employment to pay for his education as a law student. Perpiñan will freely lead his life the way he wants to. As he prepares for law school, he will always have the courage to grow and never be afraid to fail.

Such as the vaccine for the Covid-19 virus, the Molecular structure of DNA, the first image of a black hole, editing genes, electricity, and the list of many revelations made possible through Scientific investigations, hence, proving the power and significance Science had on our past, the present time, and the future to come.

Modern discoveries are the results of trial and error. One must strive to look deeper into investigations despite the challenges it brings or how ridiculous they may sound. Who knows? Your discovery could one day be recognized as one of the most beneficial contributions and memorable gifts to humanity!

Here are the Top 3 amazing scientific possibilities that you might not have heard of:

I. Meet the Real-life Iron Man Successor

Let us start with everyone's well-known superhero, Iron Man! Meet Kiara Bain, a 22-year-old engineer from Chicago, USA. She goes by the username of @kiaras_workshop on TikTok, amassing more than 600,000 followers and counting. Engineering is a type of applied science that Kiara takes advantage of to build her completely functional Ironman suit in the garage with the help of a 3D printer, Artificial Images by Kiara Bain and UniladAdventureIntelligence, and different electronics. She started with an arc reactor in 8th Grade, proving that fiction can turn into a reality. Although the guns and beams had yet to be installed, Kiara put LED lights into the eye sockets and used a helmet that can be closed by using her chin muscle movements without any kind of buttons. It also has its own Jarvis voice system! She has a Youtube channel where she shares the development process of the Iron Man suit





II. New Plastic-eating Worms discovered by Scientists

At the University of Queensland, Australia on June 9, 2022 scientists found a superworm with the scientific name of Zophobas morio, characterized by its bacterial enzymes inside the guts that can gain energy from digesting polystyrene, a plastic material used to make styrofoam. The discovery opens up a new opportunity for the Bio-upcycling method, where organisms such as the superworms are used instead to remove waste materials, especially plastic. However, it needs more extensive studies to have to discern whether consuming the components of plastics is harmful or not.

"We found the superworms fed a diet of just polystyrene not only survived but even had marginal weight gains,"

· Dr Rinke, one of the Scientists present in the study.

III. The Possibility of Bringing a 28,000-Year-Old Woolly Mammoth Back to Life

The idea of bringing an extinct species back to life such as the Mammoth seems like a bizarre dream. However, a research study at Kindai University, Japan, found that a young woolly mammoth dug out of Siberian permafrost in 2011 has its DNA partially intact. It was revealed that the cells from the 28,000-year-old specimen show signs of biological activities. "5 of the cells showed signs of an activity that occur immediately preceding cell division", earthlymission.com. Although Miyamoto, one of the researchers, admits that "we are very far from recreating a mammoth", this discovery is already an achievement itself, a sign that creates the possibility of attempting gene editing to resurrect an extinct organism.



Melting Mountain Peaks: The Secret Threat Of Climate Change

Glacier refers to the huge and thick masses of ice caused by the accumulation of snow found on mountains. The rise in sea levels due to the melting of glaciers is not the only consequence brought by the increase in temperature caused climate change. adversity had also inflicted damage to the cold peaks of such mountains in America, and especially Europe which is the most vulnerable for they are smaller. According to Summers J. in his article entitled 'The Impact of Climate Change on Mountain Ranges" (2019) found on climate.org, states the melting of glaciers can change river flow, pose threat to plants and wildlife, increase the risk of floods and precipitation, extreme rockslides as well as changes in water cycles. Residents in some parts of the inland regions threatened because some from snowmelt, therefore, the melting of its glacier can cause a scarcity of clean water. Although climate change cannot be stopped overnight, it can still be slowed down by doing your part in taking action to prevent further damage. This can be done through the practice of the 5Rs (Reuse, Reduce, Recycle, Refuse, and Rot), conserving energy spreading use, awareness, planting more trees, and the use of renewable energies. 








"Transformation of Education begins with Teachers": Mabini Chiefs takes part in Celebrating Teacher's Day



However, some people paint with colors that are neither blue nor pink. How will they live in a world where they are deemed different? How are we going to act if we are long taught that the only colors in the spectrum are blue and pink?

Before, words like "bakla" and "tomboy" were often seen as an insult. "Sayang matalino sana, kaso bakla." These are the Last August 2022, Miss Trans Global 2020 Mela Franco words you can hear from people which simply imply that gays or bisexuals can't possess admirable traits. Since we live in a country heavily influenced by Christianity, being a part of the LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer,..) community seems to be an abomination.

We have been fighting for gender equality and inclusivity for quite some time now. Abuse and discrimination against calls for the reiteration of the Gender-Responsive Basic the LGBTQ+ community sparked movements in society, one of which is the SOGIE (Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity and Expression) Equality bill. But the fight to stop the stigma was never easy.

When the late Senator Miriam Defensor-Santiago and

Akbayan Representative Etta Rosales filed the first signed by Education Undersecretary Revsee Escobedo version of the SOGIE Equality bill in the 11th congress in the year 2000, it was pending for 17 years. The said bill was then re-filed in the 14th congress but only reached the committee level. More senators tried filing the same act in the 15th and 16th congress, but to no across the region. avail; their voices were never heard.

In the 19th congress of the year 2020, the senate panel approved the revised version of the bill proposed by Senator Risa Hontiveros, the SOGIESC (Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, Gender Expression, and Sexual Characters) Equality bill. However, this doesn't end here alone. The bill must undergo several legal processes. After decades of fighting against oppression, we are now a step closer to success.

Habijan posted a statement on her Twitter account addressed to The Department of Education (DepEd). Habijan felt disappointed with the country's education system when she saw the viral photo of three gay high school students who had their long, maintained hair, cut in obedience to their school's policy. According to her, "Education for all" is not exclusive to two genders. She Education Policy or DepEd Order No. 32, s.2017.

The social media was inspired by the empathy of Mela Habijan. That's why it is no surprise that her post would become viral and later on featured in several news outlets such as the Manila Standard and the Philippine Star. Soon enough, DepEd released a memoradum

and Assistant Secretary Francis Cesar Bringas that instructs the "strict implementation" of The Gender-Responsive Basic Education Policy or DepEd Order No. 32, s.2017 in all Grade Schools and High Schools

In September 2022, a transgender teenager in Leyte was featured by ABS-CBN News when her appreciation post from her Facebook account went viral. "I'm very much blessed and grateful at the same time for being in a school that totally accepts LGBTQIA+ members of society." She quoted after her school-Leyte National High School-gave her permission to wear her desired uniform. This finally concludes that schools are indeed becoming more deferential and inclusive.

Regardless, the fight will never be over. The disease that corrupts compassion is within us, and the only way to finally end the stigma is to kill the monsters that lie upon one's self. Community roles are not exclusive to pink and blue. Let people paint their canvas with rainbows. Our world is capable of achieving greater heights if and only if we break the barriers against different social groups.

Diversity in Education, Inequity against LGBTQIA+ students in the Philippines

On August 15, 2022, Mela Franco Habijan, Miss Trans Global 2020 and LGBTQIA+ advocate, posted on Facebook her letter to Vice President and DepEd Secretary Sara Duterte-Carpio regarding the concerns of queer students as face-to-face classes are implemented for Academic Year 2022-2023.

"Trans girls in particular are being asked to cut their hair and are mandated to wear the prescribed uniform for male students - a stressor building anxiety and fear among them," Habijan stated in her letter, she also included online resources as justification that genderrelated problems cause mental health issues and other academic incompetence in students.

She also mentioned in her letter DepEd's Gender Responsive Basic Education Policy in 2017 (DO 32 s 2017), which protects LGBTQIA+ students and

teachers from discrimination and violence and encourages their inclusivity in the community.

"Sadly, some of our educator friends are still unaware of this policy," Habijan asserted. She requested an appeal to reiterate and ensure the proper implementation and preservation of the said policy across the country.

Habijan reposted the letter on August 19 while waiting for the response from VP Duterte and other DepEd officials.

"Dearest Friends, I plead: please help us amplify our call for inclusion in our DepEd schools and CHED universities and colleges," she said in the

Months after sending the letter, we can see on Habijan's Facebook page that she is sharing pictures of students and teachers from different campuses in the country who are allowed to go to school in the gender they identify as.

LGBTQIA+ advocate urges VP Duterte, DepEd to ensure transgender inclusivity as full F2F classes return

Everyone is preparing for the start of face-to-face classes, with 24,175 private and public schools, or 46% of schools nationwide, preparing to welcome back students. Habijan raised a concern regarding about transgender students being forced to cut their hair and change their clothes. Mela Habijan, an actress and advocate, appealed to the Department of Education (DepEd) to ensure that its policy against gender-based violence and discrimination in schools was implemented upon the return of face-to-face classes.

Ms. Habijan wrote, "We are receiving messages from trans and nonbinary students from different regions. They are afraid and asking for help because they want to go to school in an expression that is consistent with their gender identity—in a way that their expression of being trans and nonbinary will not be stifled."

Sadly, some of Habijan's educator friends are unaware of this policy. "The Department of Education and the Commission on Higher Education, to whom he intends to appeal, have work to do. By doing this, I am once again making an appeal to you to ensure that DepEd Order 32, section 2017 is implemented and preserved in all regions of the Philippines," Habijan wrote to the vice president.

It is encouraging to see that there are advocates who understand how transgender students feel about cutting their hair for face-to-face classes, as transgender people believe that not cutting their hair will not affect their academic performance.

Pambabae o panlalaki?

Iyan ang tanong ng mga estudyanteng transgender sa kanilang mga guro at mga paaralan ngayong nagsimula na ang transisyon mula distance learning pabalik sa face-to-face classes. Isa sa kanilang alalahanin ay kung ano nga ba ang unipormeng dapat nilang suotin bilang isang estudyanteng transgender? Dapat bang magsuot ang mga estudyanteng trans woman ng panlalaki dahil iyon ang "tanggap" ng nakararami? Dapat bang magsuot ang mga estudyanteng trans man ng pambabae dapat dahil iyon ang "akma" sa kanilang "kasarian"?

Isang balita mula sa Tacloban ang lumaganap tungkol sa isang estudyanteng trans woman na pinayagan ng kanyang eskwelahan na magsuot ng unipormeng pambabae. Marami ang nagpakita ng kanilang suporta sa pagbabagong ito ng isa sa mga mahigpit na batas sa isang paaralan na tungkol sa unipormeng dapat isuot ng mga estudyante. Ngunit sa kabila nito, karamihan pa rin sa mga paaralan sa bansa ang hindi nagbabago ng pasya at patuloy pa rin sa patakarang ang unipormeng pambabae ay para sa mga "babaeng" estudyante at ang unipormeng panlalaki ay para sa mga "lalaking" estudyante.

Tama nga ba ang hatol na ito? Hindi ba ang ibig sabihin ng pagiging trans woman ay pagiging isang tunay na babae at ang pagiging trans man naman ay nangangahulugang pagiging tunay na lalaki?

"Uniform help trans people express [ourselves]." Ayon kay Reign Charita, isang estudyante at isang trans woman. Sa isang panayam, kaniyang ibinahagi ang kanyang opinyon sa polisiya ng mga paaralan kung saan hindi pinapayagan ang mga estudyanteng transgender sa malayang pagsusuot ng unipormeng magpapahayag sa kanilang gender identity Ipinarating niya rin na ang pagsusuot ng unipormeng pambabae ay nakakatulong upang madagdagan ang kaniyang self-esteem at kumpiyansa sa pagharap sa ibang tao.

Ayon sa mga paaralang hindi pa rin pinapayagan ang kanilang mga estudyanteng transgender na magsuot ng unipormeng nagpapakita ng kanilang gender identity, ginagawa nila ito upang "protektahan" ang kanilang mga estudyante mula sa diskriminasyon at mas matinding pangungutya. Ngunit pinili namang tumutol dito ni Charita at sinabing mas dinadagdagan pa nito ang diskriminasyon sa mga katulad niyang trans woman at pati sa iba pang transgender na estudyante.

"It is not about protecting members of the LGBTQIA+ community, it [only] adds fuel to the fire of discrimination." Ito ang kaniyang pahayag nang tanungin kung ano ang opinyon niya sa sagot ng mga nasabing eskwelahan. "Kung lumaki ka sa community na open sa LGBTQIA+ community... mas maiintindihan kami."

Kung iisipin, tunay na maaaring makadagdag sa diskriminasyon sa mga transgender ang hindi pagpayag ng kanilang mga paaralan sa pagsusuot nila ng napiling uniporme. Kung ang paaralan ay hindi pumapayag sa kanilang pagsusuot ng uniporme batay sa kanilang gender identity, maaring maging dahilan ito para mas kutyain pa ng mga estudyanteng ignorante sa isyung ito ang mga miyembro ng LGBTQIA+ community, partikular na ang mga transgender.

May ilan pang kaso kung saan ang mismong mga tauhan pa ng paaralan ang harapang nagpapakita ng diskriminasyon sa kabila ng polisiya ng DepEd na Gender Responsive Basic Education Policy na may layuning protektahan ang mga estudyante mula sa diskriminasyon tungkol sa kanilang kasarian at sekswalidad.

Isang halimbawa nito ay ang sapilitang pagpapaikli ng buhok ng mga trans woman kung saan hindi sila papapasukin sa loob ng paaralan kapag mahaba ang buhok. Minsan ay ang mismong guro ang maggugupit sa kanilang buhok sa harap ng kanilang mga kamag-aral.

"Why not listen to [us] students if they want to protect [us]." Ani Charita. Bilang mga estudyanteng biktima ng diskriminasyon, sila ang nakakaalam kung anong klase ng pangungutya ang ibinabato sa kanila, kaya bakit hindi sila ang pakinggan ng paaralan?

Kaya naman ganun na lamang ang tuwa ni Charita at ng mga estudyanteng LGBTQIA+ nang sa wakas ay magkaroon na ng kompromiso sa pagitan ng kanilang paaralan at sa mga katulad nilang LGBTQIA+ advocate tungkol sa kanilang pagsusuot ng uniporme. Sa wakas ay maaari na nilang isuot ang unipormeng tunay na makakapagpakita ng kanilang gender identity.

Ito naman ang iniwan niyang mensahe para sa mga paaralang tutol pa rin sa malayang pagpapahayag ng gender identity sa tulong ng uniporme: "Sana ay mas i-open, at mas magkaroon sila ng kaliwanagan. Buksan nila ang mga mata nila sa senaryong ito, at i-eradicate ang ganoong klase ng mindset dahil dulot lang iyon ng pride nila. Sinasabing tanggap nila, pero pagdating sa ganitong usapin, hindi pumapayag. Dahil yun sa pride nila. Ayaw lang talaga nila." Dagdag pa niya: "...We are in the new era, new world where the LGBTQIA+ community is part of our community."

Mahirap para sa iba ang pagtanggap sa mga miyembro ng LGBTQIA+ community; ngunit katulad nga ng sinabi ni Charita, nasa panahon na tayo kung saan ang LGBTQIA+ community ay parte na ng ating komunidad. Kung iisipin, lagi naman silang parte ng ating komunidad, pinili lang ng nakararami na hindi sila kilalanin at tanggapin. Ang paaralan ang isa sa mga institusyon kung saan dapat naipapadama sa mga estudyante ang pagtanggap at diversidad, kaya sana ay magkaroon na ng kalayaan ang lahat ng estudyante na ipakita sa kanilang mga kamagaral ang kanilang gender identity sa tulong ng pagsusuot ng unipormeng kanilang napili.

GENDER EQUITY: Acknowledging LGBTQ Community in a FaultFinding Society

We recognize people who have been long battling about how to show who they really are, not primarily because they are ashamed of it but because of the fear of how other people will see or treat them; instances when they had to pretend and mask themselves of something "acceptable" only to feel acknowledged in a fault-finding and conforming society. LGBTQIA+ community is one of the significant examples. And when these people who are a part of that community also slowly start to unmask and accept themselves without the need for approval from others, is when society still hinders them.

But fortunately, some people are ready to express what they want to say and fight not only for themselves but for others. Truthfully, a strong and willing voice can make so much difference. This is what Mela Franco Habijan, an advocate, proved to everyone.

In a Facebook post last 15th of August 2022, LGBTQIA+ advocate and Miss Trans Global 2020 Mela Franco Habijan encouraged DepEd's Secretary and also Vice President, Sara Duterte about transgender non-discrimination on the return of schools' face-to-face classes. Habijan expressed sentiments regarding the fear of the students who want to wear a uniform that shows their chosen gender identity which is why the advocate sent a letter to the DepEd Secretary and Vice President Sara Duterte to strengthen the Gender Responsive Basic Education Policy (DO 32, s 2017).

The incident of the three discriminated young students who were demanded to cut their long hair considering the return of face-to-face classes, and a cum laude graduate's edited picture during a ceremony due to assumed "cross-dressing" also strengthened the stir of the issue.

Habijan also clarified that the Gender Responsive Basic Education Policy ensures acknowledgment, recognition, and loss of discrimination for LGBTQIA+ students and teachers in all DepEd schools in the country. However, the problem is that school heads and teachers are not entirely aware of this policy which is why it is unexecuted.

A couple of weeks after addressing the concern to DepEd, Habijan received a reply and enthusiastically shared on a Facebook post last 2nd of September about winning the battle and being heard.

The memorandum restates the strict implementation of and compliance to DepEd Order No. 32, s. 2017 titled Gender-Responsive Basic Education Policy. According to the policy, it imparts to communicate fundamental education issues relevant to gender and sexuality. It is to avoid all kinds of "gender-related violence, abuse, exploitation, discrimination, and bullying, and to

promote gender equality and non-discrimination in all governance levels."

The advocate who fought and stood firm ended the post by saying "TAOS-PUSONG PASASALAMAT SA PAMUNUAN NG DEPED, SA PAKIKIISA SA LABANG ITO! CHEERS TO INCLUSION!"

Mela Franco Habijan, without a doubt became the voice of those who struggle in this fight. With the bravery and compassion that the advocate showed, we are all hoping for the prejudice against LGBTQIA+ community to vanish and for everyone to have a healthier and open mind.

The LGBTQIA+ Community and Their Fight for Freedom in the Philippines

Miss Trans Global 2020 and LGBTQIA + advocate Mella Franco Habijan urge Vice President Sara Duterte, also the Department of Education (DepEd) Secretary, to ensure the inclusivity of transgenders in school as full face-to-face classes return on August 20, 2022.

The talk about the inclusivity of transgender brought a spark when Habijan in a Facebook post shared a letter she sent Vice President Duterte, which she raised about transgender people being barred from coming to school in the gender they identify as. According to her, trans girls are being asked to cut their hair and are mandated to wear the prescribed uniform for male students which gives anxiety and fear among students.

In recent years, policymakers and school administrators in the Philippines have acknowledged that bullying of LGBTQIA+ youth is a serious issue and have developed initiatives to address it. A Child Protection Policy was implemented in 2012 by the Department of Education (DepEd), which is responsible for supervising primary and secondary schools. It was created to address bullying and discrimination in schools, including that based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

The Anti-Bullying Law of 2013 was passed by Congress the following year. Its implementing rules identity as prohibited justifications for bullying and harassment. These rules haven't been properly implemented, despite looking good on paper. Numerous LGBTQIA+ youth still encounter bullying and harassment at school in the absence of implementation and proper monitoring. LGBTQIA+ students and teachers must feel welcome and safe in schools. Everyone should have equal access to opportunities and services, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. A comprehensive anti-discrimination law is needed in the Philippines to protect LGBTQIA+ students and teachers. The removal of the uniform and the restriction on hair length should be approved to begin protecting students and teachers from discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity.

With just an hour's drive from Metro Manila, the Masungi Georeserve from the Rizal Province is a gem of rock formation and forest that is a hit among tourists. It offers a breathtaking view of the Sierra Madre Mountains. The development of this conservation project dates back to the year 2000. While the staff of Masungi has preserved the area for years, the threat of the illegal encroachers remains a challenge to this day, a challenge that protecting this paradise entails danger that its rangers have long accepted.

In 2000, the department of environment and natural resources tapped blue construction to convert the land into a conservation park. "We saw promise in the land," says Ben Dumailang, the founder of masungi reserve. Two decades later, the Masungi Georeserve is now one of the top destinations in Rizal Province. Masungi Georeserve is now recognized globally for its efforts toward conservation and reforestation. The Masungi Georeserve was hailed as one of the world's most innovative and sustainable tourism projects by the United Nations World Tourism in 2019. Ben, his daughters, and the forest rangers guard the Masungi Georeserve vow to continue protecting the land.





AU-JRC PREPARATION FOR FACE-TO-FACE CLASSES BY NOVEMBER

A student orientation and parent-teacher meeting was held on October 28, 2022, in the AU-JRC JHS Department to get ready for the start of in-person classes. On November 2, 2022, JHS students will attend a faceto-face student orientation. The following week, they will only have two days of in-person classes and three days of online classes. The first week will be made up of online classes on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and in-person classes on Thursday and Friday. The following week will be the opposite, with in-person classes on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and online classes on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and online classes on Thursday and Friday. The JHS school day runs from 7 am to 11:30 am, with asynchronous classes continuing after that.

Arellano University - Jose Rizal Campus follows a strict protocol for COVID-19 where students must present their vaccination card and school ID upon entering the campus. Then, they will undergo temperature checking; if it is high, the student will be directed to a holding area where they are monitored in the meantime. However, if their temperature remains high after 5-10 minutes, the school working personnel will provide a KN95 mask, and fill out a health form before calling their parent/guardian to pick them

Likewise, before entering the classroom, they must wash their hands in the hand-washing area with the provided soap and water. Furthermore, the teacher will greet them at the entrance to each classroom and check to see whether their name is on the list of students in that section.

Also, there are chair numbers assigned to each student to make sure that all students have heir own seats and do not switch.

Canteens will also be closed during break time. Hence, the school encourages students to bring their food or packed lunches to have something to eat inside the classroom and to avoid contamination and other threats. A Wellness Covid kit is also required for students to bring to in-person classes.

Ariel As Colored





Commuting Experience of Non-Manila Resident Senior High School Students in the First Face-to-Face Classes

It's Arellano University's first face-to-face class for its students. And I can see from their faces that they are enthusiastic about attending their first day of face-to-face classes. It's hard to believe that the last time all of us ever attended school onsite was way back in 2020—after two years of struggling with online teaching. Although there were many challenges and difficulties in making face-to-face classes possible, it has been well thought out for the whole university. I think we can all agree that we're better able to listen and study if we're learning in school rather than at home.

Blended learning, as they say, is the new normal.

Students sometimes attend inperson classes and other times participate in distance learning. Even though the majority of the students want face-to-face classes to be implemented, we should keep in mind that inperson classes also have their cons. One of which, we can safely say, is commuting.

Out of the 29 students who took the poll, 38% are non-Manila residents. The purpose of this survey is to know why a minority of students chose to study at a distant school and faced the challenges of commuting there.

Because I myself am a non-Manila resident, I will also have to deal with the challenges of commuting until the end of the school year. Of the 11 students who are non-Manila residents, I wanted to share the experiences two of them have had commuting to school.

Rain, a Quezon City resident, chose to study at Arellano University despite knowing the challenges of commuting because he had heard about their good educational system. The route that he took the first day he went to school was a long one. First, from his home, he needed to walk to a tricycle station to get him to the road where jeepneys take passengers.


After getting inside the jeepney, he then gets off in Anonas, where he needs to take the LRT. Upon entering the train full of passengers, Rain stands for about seven stations before getting off. And from there, he walked all the way to school. Rain commuted to school for about 40 minutes, and by the time he got there, he was worn out and exhausted. It all took him about 50 pesos back and forth, considering that the LRT is still free for the students. It is expected that free LRT rides will only last until the fifth of November, so no more free rides for Rain.

JD is a student all the way from the capital city of Rizal, Antipolo. He chose to study at Arellano University because it is one of his dream schools. JD, similar to Rain, also takes the LRT to school. First, he had to walk two to three minutes from his house to the jeepney station, where it would take him to the LRT station in Antipolo. And from there, the long journey begins. He said the only problem with him taking the jeepney is the traffic. And after that, he can finally relax inside the air-conditioned train. His trip took approximately an hour and a half to get to school. He leaves early so that he also arrives even before time. The expenses he had come up with were about 80 pesos back and forth. He stated that even after the long trip it took him to get to school, he didn't even find himself tired or exhausted.

Even though the majority of students do not need to travel from one city to another, we should also be aware of the difficulties that commuter students will have to endure for an entire academic year. It must just take some getting used to, I suppose. Rain will eventually start to get used to the way JD does.

Climate change—most of you probably heard it from your Science Teacher's lesson in school, on a daily news broadcast, or from environmental activists' protests. It's a term that has been heard over the years but was never understood—or had always been neglected. As Super Typhoon Karding runs through the country, there was no change in climate change; it has yet again highlighted its detrimental effects.

According to the United Nations (UN), climate change refers to long-term shifts in temperatures and weather patterns. It can affect our health, ability to grow food, housing, safety, and work. As the long list of damaging effects it brings appears, the long pause from awareness and action adheres. Like a morning alarm clock, it looks like people and the system needs a strong and surprising wake-up call—one of which is a super typhoon.

Similar to how people suddenly remember the mountains of Sierra Madre, climate change is something that has repeatedly been ringing in everyone's ears as Typhoon Karding surges the Philippines. A civil engineer and wind dynamics expert, Joshua Agar, told INQUIRER on September 30, 2022, that the country may see stronger typhoons in the future due to climate change. "Expect typhoons like Karding that are small in size but with super destructive winds near the eye." Agar quoted. These types of statements alone could stir up sheer panic in the masses.

As the community and whole nation succumb to fear with the massive damages brought by Karding on agriculture, infrastructure, and death tolls widely recognized through the five volunteers in Bulacan renowned as the new heroes of the country, the majority awaits the urgency of the system's reform, for the immediate plan of action—a true sense of authority that doesn't depend on the resilience of the Filipino people; one that recognizes that individual efforts couldn't change the way climate change is right now.

At a recent UN Forum held last September 6, 2022, in Manila, the plan of attaining holistic climate justice and equity, as well as proper climate financing, is one of the goals they proposed.

Environment Secretary Maria Antonia Yulo-Loyzaga said, "Without global transformation and adequate financial resources dedicated to solving the climate change problem, which has reached emergency status, any agreement will be meaningless." Later on, Yulo-Loyzaga's statement was seconded by Robert E.A. Borje, Climate Change Commission (CCC) vice chairman and executive director as he quoted, "Urgent delivery of needs-based climate finance on loss and damage is crucial to transformative climate actions by at-risk developing nations. Gone are the days of empty commitments — now is the time to implement, to deliver actions with results."

Climate change indeed grew to change as time flew but it didn't grow weaker like what people had aimed to; rather, it has only become stronger and bigger. Contradictory to that are the changes the nation has made. We're walking on a linear phase wherein there are no heightening improvements but heightening damages instead.

Even though we could technically receive a "change" for the risks we pay because of better and wider growth of some plants due to global warming and climate change—as study shows, or through the benefits of the economy for the businesses related to this matter, it doesn't change the fact that these short-term positive effects might cause us—or had already been causing our long-term problems.

"The climate crisis has already been solved. We already have all the facts and solutions. All we have to do is to wake up and change." Greta Thunberg, a popular and young climate activist said on TEDx Stockholm around December 2018.

Through those vast changes in the extremity of climate change, this thing truly depends on our hands. With our individual efforts, together with the acknowledgment of scientists' and experts' calls and means, over and above the cooperation and amelioration of the state and the system, we could definitely combat climate change—if and only if; we allow ourselves to be part of the change.

Defying Improbabilities: Steven Paabo grabs 2022 Nobel Prize in Medicine for his improbable research

Swedish geneticist Steven Pääbo successfully grabbed the 2022 Nobel Prize in Physiology in Medicine in October, featuring hisonce improbable discovery about "discovering concerning the genomes of extinct hominins and human evolution." 25 years ago, Pääbo and his team began the research after discovering 40,000 years old bones from a Neanderthal, our closest human relative.

TAKING A BOLD RESPONSIBILITY

Many people did not believe nor support the study conducted because it was too impossible or improbable. Steven wanted to focus on the Deoxyribonucleic acid or DNA of the Neanderthals; however, DNA is said to degrade after 521 years. Instead, the adjunct professor at Okinawa Institute of

In the first century A.D., Petronius Arbiter created a doll that moved like a human being. While in 1557, Giovanni Torriani invented a wooden robot that could collect the Emperor's daily bread from the shop. The 19th century was also full of innovative robotic inventions, such as Edison's talking doll and Canadians' steam-powered robot.

However, these historical discoveries may have planted the initial seeds of inspiration for the contemporary robot. The scientific development in robotics in the 20th century outnumbered prior accomplishments a thousandfold and was then utilized in the medical field.

Robots are revolutionizing the way operations are carried out in the medical community. Eric J. Moore, Professor of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery, stated that in 1985, the first surgical robot, PUMA 560, was utilized in a stereotaxic operation in which computed tomography was used to assist the robot as it placed a needle into the brain for biopsy. However, it was a process that was previously prone to mistakes due to hand tremors during needle insertion.

There were several cases when robots assisted in surgeries and these are among them:

(1) The da Vinci Surgical System allows surgeons to have more exact control over a variety of treatments. The da Vinci System uses magnified 3D high-definition vision and controls that strap to a surgeon's wrists and hands to perform tiny, precise incisions that human hands would not be able to do otherwise. This gives doctors more control, and because the technique is less intrusive than standard surgery, patients recuperate faster.

(2) The Cyberknife is a robotic surgical system that uses submillimeter accuracy to deliver radiation treatment to malignancies. The CyberKnife technology, developed in the 1990s, is currently utilized to treat cancer in hospitals and treatment centers across the United States. It is said that the procedure is non-invasive and reduces radiation exposure to

Science and Technology focused on the mitochondria to pursue the progress of the study.

At first, due to the lack of instruments and the state of technology, it was difficult to create an accurate structure to back up his research. Fortunately, as the years passed, his bold responsibility began to bear fruit as a result of technological advancement. The Nobel Committee praised Steven for his determination in the study,

"Through his pioneering research, Svante Paabo accomplished something seemingly impossible: sequencing the genome of the Neanderthal, an extinct relative of present-day humans. He also made the sensational discovery of a previously unknown hominin, Denisova." Steven's success also made him question himself based on the contemporary issues the society is encountering, all about racism.

OPENING EXPERIMENTAL DEVELOPMENT

"Sometimes I think it's interesting to think about if Neanderthals had survived another 40,000 years, how would that influence us?" Pääbo stated. "Would we see even worse racism against Neanderthals, because they were really in some sense different from us? Or would we actually see our place in the living world quite in a different way when we would have other forms of humans there that are very like us but still different? We wouldn't make this very clear distinction between animals and humans that we do so easily today." The distinctive qualities of the two, although related, can be significantly observed. Other scientists, paleontologists, and even archaeologists have attempted to take a deeper dive into the study, but they were unsuccessful in obtaining the answers to the fundamental questions on the surface that made Steven stand out. He was able to present evidence of the human bones of a Neanderthal, particularly in the finger that was later found inside a cave in Siberia. The 67-year-old professor thought it would be much clearer if he was not influenced by his mother and father, who are also working in the same field.

A GENERATIONAL SCIENTIFIC DISCOVERY

Steven Pääbo's father, Sune Bergström, also won a Nobel Prize in 1982, shared with John R. Vane and Bengt I. Samuelsson for their successful discovery of prostaglandins and other related substances. However, it was his mother, not his father, who had the most influence on him. Pääbo said he was a bit sad that his mother could not experience it. His mother was into science, so she encouraged Pääbo to be exposed to it. "She... was very much into science, and very much stimulated and encouraged me through the years. My father and I did have some contact, too, and he took a big interest in my work, but it was not as close a relationship as with my mother." Steven Pääbo won a total of 10 million Swedish Krona, which is roughly around 910,000 U.S. dollars. Until this day, empirical experiences like Steven's are proof that you can always defy improbabilities. You will be able to contribute to and change society through science if you have enough courage and determination.

(3) The automated and portable Xenex Germ-Zapping Robot disinfects whole hospital rooms in minutes using pulsed, full-spectrum UV rays that destroy a variety of infectious germs. It is intended to minimize hospital-acquired infections (HAIs) like Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) by eliminating the germs that cause them, which can be particularly resistant to therapy. Along with the previously indicated benefits of robots in the medical profession, the following disadvantages exist: (1) The high expense of putting in a robotic surgery system can raise the price of surgical treatment as surgical robots are expensive to maintain.

(2) The amount of time it takes the robot to execute the surgeon's directions. (3) It may create several complications in surgeries, and (4) robots will replace people, resulting in urban unemployment.

Robots are present all around us, whether they are automated robots that construct our automobiles or virtual assistants who help us through human-computer interaction. However, how far can robotics prosper in the field of medicine?

PH Investing in R&D: A Key to a Progressive and Decent Environment

Whenever an illness or disease is featured on the news, many Filipinos are immediately threatened without knowing its intensive explanation and development. They are prone to misinformation or commonly known as "fake news." The problem has brought various circumstances to the Philippines right now. Amid the ongoing health crisis brought on by COVID-19, which turned into a pandemic, many illnesses and diseases developed and surged around the globe. But, how do scientists and microbiologists discover these illnesses? How can the government help to solve these issues? Does the government invest enough in this field? This is because of research and development conducted by them. Without research and development, we would have suffered more than what we are experiencing now. This is why the Philippine government should focus and invest more in research and development.

As of 2020, the Philippines allocated only 15% of its total GDP to research and development, which is less than the one percent suggested by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

Recently, the Philippine Council for Industry, Energy, and Emerging Technology Research and Development (PCIEERD) executive director, Enrico Paringit, stated that the sector is targeting raising its budget allocation to 16.13 billion Philippine pesos from 2022 to 2024. With over 397 project proposals received, they need to have 6.44 billion PHP to fund them.

He added, "R&D should form the backbone of interventions, especially when people's lives are at greatest risk. Our scientists and researchers have shown that they are quick to respond to the pandemic—rolling out technologies such as locally-made personal protective equipment, resource monitoring apps, and use of analytics for science-based and data-driven decision making." Indeed, R&D plays a crucial role in helping developers quickly respond when the place is at risk. Through R&D, the Philippines would have a better environment for Filipinos to have a sustainable country to live in.

According to the latest statistics tallied by Statista, the United States of America is the top global investor in research and development as of August 5. This year, the country has allocated 679 billion U.S. dollars, followed by China, which is expected to raise it to 551.1 billion U.S. dollars. These countries focus on growing the field for the following reasons: (1) it may reduce poverty; (2) it helps the country to build a stronger economy; and (3) it contributes largely to a country's planning on how it can be sustainable

Unlike the U.S. and China, the Philippines is a developing country and has a huge economic gap. However, the very reasons they are attempting to avoid are the problems that the country is currently facing. The Philippine Statistics Authority, or PSA, said that 19.9 million Filipinos have been experiencing poverty, which represents 18 percent of the Philippines' population. This is about a percent or two higher than the recorded population living in poverty in 2018 — 17.67 million Filipinos.

Introducing research and development empowerment may help to encourage young people to have an apparent hope of becoming successful and emerging scientists, microbiologists, and other health-related and developmental study fields.

As a developing country, this can build a huge momentum for economic, social, and political development, as it is key for a country's remarkable progression. Science and technology could be the core of prevention, cure, and maturation. Investing in research and development is what the government must prioritize at the moment, for it will have long-term effects, helping us to create a country with decent knowledge nourished with facts with the help of science.

Meanwhile, the Philippines' notable ability in technology was highlighted as state university students named "Team Paradocs" became one of the chosen finalists for the Association of Southeast Asian Nation Data Science Explorers or ASEAN DSE.

Prince Jewel Federe is currently a BS in Computer Science student, while Kim Carlo Monloy studies a BS in Molecular Biology and Biotechnology. This duo held an impressive proposal that would increase sustainable food production through community gardens and vermiculture hubs.

They pitched an idea of upcycling food named as "Earthleigh project" which lets people grow their crops through gardens and use the leftovers to feed worms, a process called vermicomposting. Aside from this, they also included developing a mobile app that would guide people with the information they needed to start and sustain the aforementioned community gardens and vermiculture hubs.



NCAA SEASON 98: ARELLANO TAKES NO. 5 SPOT AFTER FIRST ROUND

The Arellano Chiefs ended the first round on a low note after succumbing to a 80-82 defeat against the LPU Pirates, in the NCAA Season 98 men's basketball tournament, at the FilOil EcoOil Centre, Tuesday, October 11, 2022.

Axel Doromal continued to be the bright spot in Arellano's menace journey this season, recording a game-high 21 points, two rebounds, and a pair of assists. The second highest scorer for the Red-and-Blue was veteran Shane Menina with 12 points.a

Patrick Montano led the Pirates with a stellar performance, who scored 16 points off the bench while grabbing seven rebounds. Starters John Barba and Mclaude Guadana scored 15 points and fourteen points, respectively, as they put up a balanced scoring effort en route to a cardiac finish.

Scintillating first half

The Arellano Chiefs took advantage of Pirates' early struggle on offense, trailing them in the first few minutes of the first period as Doromal scored a lay-up which was followed by a three-pointer from Shane Menina that gave them an early 8-point deficit. It wasn't until LPU's Coach Malabanan prompted to make a shot call where they took some early offensive woes and relied on their stark defense to pad their advantage, Pirates took the lead, 10halfway into the opening period; thanks to Mac Guadana and John Barba's aggression in the paint.

Padaña and Oftana traded shots from beyond the arc with 57.4 left in the quarter, as Guadana joined the showdown with another three for Pirates, leading the Chiefs by five. Cade Flores made it possible to cut the deficit to 3 after a rebound shot via Doromal. The first quarter ended with the Chiefs being down to LPU, 19-22.

Accomplishing HER-Story: PH Filipinas clinches FIFA World Cup slot for the first time

After over two decades of drought, the Philippines successfully entered the FIFA Women's World Cup.

The Philippine women's football representatives escaped Chinese Taipei through a heartstopper match inside the Shri Shiv Chhatrapati Sports Complex in Pune, India, as Sarina Bolden helped the Filipinas secure their historic victory over Chinese Taipei with her last penalty shot, 4-3, to finally secure a spot on the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023 that will happen in New Zealand and Australia in July 20 to August 2023.

Finishing in 3rd or 4th place, the Philippines joined China, Japan, and South Korea in occupying a world cup slot after defeating Chinese Taipei

in the quarterfinals, but then lost to South Korea, which was hailed as the tournament's runner-up. It has not been an easy journey for the PH team since their opening game against Thailand, where they lacked players due to COVID-19 health protocols. Fortunately, it did not stop the fireball performance of Filipinas and they won 1-0 against the Thais, courtesy of Chandler McDaniel at the 81st minute of the game.

They lost against the Aussies in their second game via a dominating game for the Aussies with a 4-0 scoreboard led by Samantha Kerr,

Dominique Randle, Emily van Egmond, and Mary Fowler. But it did not hinder the Filipinas' determination to bombard the Indonesians and advance to the quarterfinals in a 6-0 fashion. Katrina Guillou scored an impressive yet early goal in the first six minutes of the game.

Their last qualifying match off to the semis was a crucial and their most difficult game, which made them remarkable for Philippine women's football as they are the first-ever representatives for the country to grab a ticket to the FIFA World Cup 2023.

Seen with tears, it was a prophecy granted by the 2005 Philippine Women's National Football Head Coach, Ernest Nierras, who believed that Filipinas will make it on the world stage at the right time.

A month-long tournament will be held from July to August in 2023. On October 22, 2022, the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup seeding took place at Aotea Center, New Zealand. Philippines was seeded in Group A along with the host, New Zealand, world No. 12 Norway, and world No. 21 Switzerland.

The Lady Bulldogs stole the show in straight sets, 9-25, 17-25, and 14-25.

However, the loss of the Arellano University in Shakey's Super League will not distract the Chiefs to aim higher and get stronger as they return to prepare for the upcoming NCAA season and reclaim the championship title. They may have ended their campaign, but coach Roberto "Obet" Javier believes it was a perfect opportunity for them to come tougher.

After all, it was a learning experience for the NCAA's reigning silver medalist.

Even Pornpun Geudpard praised the Philippines after the game for their majestic performance. "They play very well, and they make our team crazy." What made the Philippines emotional was their classification match against Australia, whom they've never beaten on the PWNVT's entire AVC journey. While interviewing, Jia De Guzman and Jema Galanza were in tears as they made history for the Philippines after winning against Australia, 21-25, 25-19, 19-25, 25-18, and 15-12. This made their classification ranking to be determined against Chinese Taipei, where they lost but were content with their AVC 2022 journey on a higher note.

Axel Doromal, lone-starter on the floor, opened the second quarter from a left-wing that cut LPU's lead to just one, 21-22. Looking to continue their momentum in the second quarter, Chiefs challenged the redand-silver team with a neck-to-neck battle, giving them just a two to four point lead in sequences. Cade Flores closed the period through a mid-range jumper, 42-44, Pirates still leading.

Game of runs

Both teams' offenses started to get going at the start of the third quarter, as the Chiefs scored five quick points off of a three and dribble penetration play. This was matched by the Pirates' big man Umali as he aggressively stifled Arellano on defense, tallying two consecutive boards, 54-51.

Axel Doromal continued to be the spark plug of the team as he gave Chiefs' last eight points off two three-pointers and a lay-up from the top of the key to erase the lead, 54-54. However, the Pirates went on a scoring explosion and answered with a stifling 14-2 run—propelled by their trademark defense and mastery on the fastbreak. The Chiefs were not able to match their opponents' firepower and fell behind, 14-2 run, at the end of the third quarter, 58-70.

Not enough firepower

The Chiefs started the fourth quarter with a high-octane offense. After Pirates' Montano opened the scoring for his squad, the Chiefs went on a 15-7 run, which was capped by a Abastillas lay-up off a good defensive sequence.

As both teams could not find the bottom of the net, the game lost its action for several minutes until Umali broke the ice with a quick offensive drive at the 2:55 mark. Doromal answered by converting a lay-up of his own with 1:29 left in the fourth period. After Guadana successfully faked a three-point shot to Valdez, Menina fired a crucial three and cut the lead to three, 78-81, with 48.6 left in the regulation. Despite that, Chiefs failed to capitalize as Menina missed a heavily contested three that led to the game-winning free throws of Lyceum to set the final score, 80-82.

Though there are three teams who are yet to play their last games, the first round of the tournament is officially finished as CSB solidifies their hold at the first seed with a record of five wins and one loss after eight games.
